# Wick Award (Hackney Wick)

- Evaluated their work 3 different times
- Young people '<u>Through Young Eyes</u>'
- Surveys with residents aged 60-plus
- Wick Award accessed measuring change support that produced 'Wick Award Measuring Change Report January 2023' with Renaisi

## What the evaluations achieved

- Helped understand community needs
- Formed the basis of all their work
- Evidence-based which meant they were targeting their work where it was needed most
- Say in deciding activities and shaped services based on local knowledge
- Flexible and adapted to change

## Wider outcomes from the evaluation

- Awarded grant funding
- More community spaces to meet
- Residents as local advisors to improve services and inclusivity for older residents
- More youth services and sports (went from 1 youth worker to having 9)
- Activities run by residents
- Event launch local stakeholders increased connections, further funding

# Heart of Sidley

- Heart of Sidley Big Local secured Community Ownership grant funding to redevelop a building at Sidley Recreation Ground (Sidley Recreation Ground) in January 2023.
- Commissioned professional services to prepare proposal to fund the redevelopment.
- First bid failed; second bid was successful.
- Influenced Rother District Council to work in partnership to redevelop the site.

# Consultation & Evaluation

- Heart of Sidley conducted community consultation and showcased their impact through their previous investment in BMX track at Sidley Recreational Ground.
- "Make sure you tell them what you want and how many people it will benefit. Make sure it is a viable project."
